The conference will be held Friday March 23, 2012 and Saturday March 24, 2012 at the Graduate Center 365 5th Ave New York, NY. Rooms C201 and C202. Reception and refreshments will be in DSC rooms, 5th floor.

Event Information

The XVII Annual HLBLL Student Conference invites students of a variety of backgrounds world-wide to submit papers relating to Hispanic and Luso-Brazilian Literatures and Languages. Submissions are invited from all periods and areas of Iberian, Spanish-American, Hispanic/Latino, Luso-Brazilian Literatures, Film, Visual and Performing Arts, as well as any area of Hispanic Linguistics (theoretical, applied, or sociolinguistics). Papers may be presented in English, Spanish or Portuguese. We hold the conference over the course of two days in order to give students the opportunity to attend a wider variety of panels and in order to accommodate two keynote speakers. Based on last year's attendance we estimate that approximately 50-60 people will attend each of the two days. Rather than divide the audience between concurrent panels on one day, we have found success with the two day format.

In addition to student presentations, our conference will include keynote speeches from Professor Eva Juarros-Daussa from the University at Buffalo and Professor Gabriel Giorgi from New York University. Professor Juarros-Daussa will be speaking on linguistics. Her presentation is titled "Language Attitudes and Choices by Catalan and Galician Families in New York City." Dr. Juarros-Daussa's background is unique in the sense that it combines Philology, Linguistics and Cognitive Science. Therefore, Dr. Juarros-Daussa's speech will certainly appeal to a wide audience. Professor Giorgi is an expert in the fields of Literature from the Southern Cone, biopolitics, queer theory and gender studies and as such will attract students from different fields of study. His presentation is entitled "La voz animal. Políticas de lo viviente e imaginación estética." Prof. Juarras-Daussa's presentation will be in English while Professor Giorgi will present in Spanish. We believe that the varied backgrounds of these professors will encourage a wide variety of individuals to attend the conference. As an incentive to the speakers we have offered honorariums of \$500. We understand the importance of quality keynote speakers and feel that this offer helps attract a higher caliber of presentations to offer to those in attendance. Before we had decided on this amount we were turned down by a couple of potential speakers and have used this amount as an aggressive recruiting strategy for high quality speakers.

We have sent our call for papers to many universities world-wide (North America, Central America, South America, and Europe) as well as distributed the call for papers to multiple departments within the Graduate Center community (Sociology, Comparative Literature, Theater, Art History, Political Science, Film, Linguistics, Anthropology). We have received abstracts from Brazil, Portugal, Spain, and England, not to mention North American institutions.

The purpose of this conference is to highlight the exceptional work being done by graduate students in the areas of Hispanic and Luso-Brazilian literatures and linguistics as well as visual arts, performing arts and film related to these areas. This conference is also meant to serve as a networking opportunity for students within these particular fields of study. Many conferences in Hispanic and Luso-Brazilian studies focus on either literature or linguistics and this conference gives students the opportunity to attend diverse student panels as well as the chance to attend keynote speeches on both fields of study. In addition the conference serves as an opportunity for students to prepare for future academic life in that they are able to develop professionally in an academic setting prior to entering the job market. Moreover, it has fostered academic contributions to our student-run journal.

This conference has grown considerably over the last few years and as such requires a certain level of funding. We are proud to provide the opportunity for students to come together to listen to and review work by other students as well as to have their own work reviewed and discussed. In particular, the dinner provided on Friday evening serves as an incredible networking opportunity for all of the students involved in the conference whether as participants or spectators. A few examples of the success of this networking opportunity include students from outside of the GC community meeting professors from the GC community with whom they later took classes as well as students from within the program meeting professors who can serve as potential dissertation committee members in the future. It has served to encourage students to attend the HLBLL program here at the Graduate Center over other university programs. The keynote speakers and Graduate Center professors have historically attended this dinner and as such have been able to continue conversations related to earlier presentations as well as to better know students who they will potentially work with in the future.
